



Infant and Toddler Fluoride Varnish Program

Student Interns from UIUC working on CRAYON research are available daily in the MCH/WIC reception area to talk with parents of infants and toddlers about proper oral care for their children. The students are trained to provide education regarding Early Childhood Caries and complete questionnaires with parents to screen for risk factors associated with ECC. Parents are given an age appropriate toothbrush for their child and information about CUPHD's Fluoride Varnish Program. Additional Oral Health Education and Fluoride Varnish treatments are available to infants and toddlers participating in CUPHD's Maternal & Child Health WIC program. A hygienist is available on a walk-in basis two afternoons per month. Parents are instructed in the proper care of their child's teeth while the hygienist screens for moderate to high risks of developing Early Childhood Caries and a fluoride varnish treatment if indicated after also being examined by a CUPHD dentist. The parent receives written instructions about how to care for their child's developing teeth and an age appropriate toothbrush. Written materials are available in English and Spanish.

In informational meeting was held at Round Barn. Seven people were interested in registering for the 4-week class that includes conversation maps on living with diabetes.

Diabetes Outreach meetings

Three Diabetes outreach meetings were held in April at Round Barn, Washington Square, and Sunnycrest Manor. A total of <u>23</u> participated. We held discussions on getting longer periods of sleep and being thrifty while shopping. Participants shared hints and suggestions on ways to reduce food costs and the importance of sleep especially at night to reduce blood pressure and to prevent plaque build up. Also addressed were new changes in the sweetner market and the uses of blood glucose testing and the steps needed assure accurate results.

Annual Review

Thank you for completing the yearly diabetes self survey! This survey is very helpful in understanding diabetes care in our county. Below are some of your statistics for 2008.

Times in the past year your feet where examined by a health professional:

70% had 1 or more foot exams in the last year



- Remember to take off your socks and shoes while you wait for your physical examination.
- ▶ Your health care provider should perform a complete foot exam at least annually - more often if you have foot problems.
- ▶ Call or see your health care provider if you have cuts or breaks in the skin, or have an ingrown nail. Also, tell your health care provider if your foot changes color, shape, or just feels different (for example, becomes less sensitive or hurts).

2. Have you had a flu shot in the past year?

85% had flu immunizations

Flu Shots

- ▶ In general, every person with diabetes needs a flu shot each year. Talk with your doctor about having a flu shot.
- ▶ Flu shots make it much harder for you to catch the flu for about 6 months.
- ► For extra safety, it's a good idea for the people you live with or spend a lot of time with to get a flu shot, too. You are less likely to get the flu if the people around you don't have it.

3. Have you ever heard of Glycosylated Hemoglobin or Hemoglobin A1C?

78% reported they knew what a Hemoglobin A1c test was

84% reported their A1c was tested 1 or more times in the last year

Importance of Hemoglobin A1c Test

- ▶ The hemoglobin A1c test is an important blood test used to determine how well your diabetes is being controlled over a 3 month period. It is used in conjunction with home blood sugar monitoring to make adjustments in your diabetes medicines.
- ▶ People with diabetes should have this test every 3-6 months to determine whether their blood sugars have reached the target level of control.
- Experts recommend checking at least 2 times a year

5. Have you had a dilated eye exam?

82% reported a dilate eye exam in the last year



 See your eye care professional at least once a year for a dilated eye exam



- 6. How many times a day do you check your blood sugar?
- 91% reported testing their blood sugar 1 or more times a day
- ► Blood glucose levels that vary widely may indicate a problem
- ► Several random measurements may be taken throughout the day
- ▶Try testing before a meal or 2 hours after eating

Tobacco Programs

Project TNT is a 10 session program delivered in 5th grade classes. This program is different from most tobacco education curriculums in that it focuses on changing normative beliefs about the prevalence of tobacco use. Further, instead of just giving participants reasons not to use tobacco, it equips participants with decision-making skills as well as effective communication skills.

Juvenile Detention Center Outreach- various days throughout the month, our health educators provide a variety of programs to the youth in the Juvenile Detention Center. Topics include sexual health, nutrition, and tobacco.

Osteoporosis Prevention for Teens- Bone Up!- three session program for junior high and high school girls to teach them the importance of building bones now to prevent osteoporosis later. The girls learned the importance of calcium, and foods that hinder and help the absorption of calcium, and make plans to increase calcium. They learn to make healthy calcium-rich snacks and they get to try them. They also learn the importance of weight-bearing exercise and earn gear to assist them with increasing this activity.



In March 142 girls in the County, and 50 girls in the District completed the first two sessions.



CATCH ProgramsLucky Tray Day is offered to our partner CATCH schools. We send CUPHD staff, interns, and volunteers to schools at lunch. If the students are eating their GO foods, they get a raffle ticket. At the end of the day 3 students are selected to win prizes.

Fitness Fridays/Moving Mondays are days that our CATCH schools ask students to move when told over the intercom. We also offer structured physical activities at recess

Champaign Urbana Public Health District's (CUPHD) Vision Cooperative offers eye exams and eye glasses to people who have Illinois Public Aid as their insurance. CUPHD Vision Cooperative staff act as the gatekeeper to a coalition of area optometrists and an ophthalmologist who have offered to be a part of this great program. By calling the Lens Line (217-531-5367) a person can receive access to an eye exam by one of the participating licensed eye professional provider and access to the CUPHD eye glass program.

Once a person receives an eye exam and a prescription for eye glasses, the Vision Cooperative schedules the person for eye glass fitting and selection. CUPHD has a wide selection of 49 different eye glass frames that are available in different colors. CUPHD Vision Cooperative is able to bill Illinois Public Aid for the eye glasses and lenses; therefore there is no cost to the client for the eye glass frames and lenses.

Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer (IBCCP) contracts with local medical providers to provide free breast and cervical cancer screening for Illinois women ages 35-64 with no health insurance, Medicaid, or Medicare part B. The CUPHD IBCCP serves women from Champaign, McLean and Vermilion Counties. CUPHD IBCCP provides community outreach as well as educational materials and presentations throughout our service area to encourage all women to have their annual screenings done and to seek new client enrollment in order to provide uninsured screenings for women who would otherwise have no access to theses services. Approximately 40% of the screening tests yield abnormal results requiring IBCCP medical case management and diagnostics services. While women under the age of 35 are not eligible for screening through this program, they may be eligible for medically indicated diagnostic services if referred by their medical provider. If diagnosed, eligible women are transferred into Medicaid for cancer treatment.
