Men's Screening Clinic

SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASE (STD) SCREENING

The Champaign-Urbana Public Health District (CUPHD) is conducting a "Screening Clinic" for men of all ages. In these clinics, men can be tested for Gonorrhea and Chlamydia through a urine specimen. In addition, participants can receive testing for Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) and Syphilis through a blood specimen. The results of any of these tests will be available 7 to 10 days after each clinic.

PROSTATE CANCER SCREENING

Men over 40 years of age will now be able to be screened for Prostate Cancer. A PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) test can be done with a simple blood draw. This test will tell you if a problem is present.

As with many types of cancers, medical experts do not know what causes prostate cancer. They do know that certain risk factors are linked to the disease. The chance of getting prostate cancer goes up as a man gets older. About 2 out of every 3 prostate cancers are found in men over the age of 65. If someone has a family history of prostate cancer, they have a higher risk of getting the disease.

Though all men are at risk, African American men have higher rates of getting and dying from prostate cancer than men of other racial or ethnic groups in the United States. Prostate cancer is the fourth leading cause of death among African American men over age 45. Every 100 minutes, an African

American male dies from prostate cancer. Not smoking, eating a healthy diet, staying physically active, and seeing your doctor may reduce your risk for prostate cancer.

BLOOD PRESSURE, GLUCOSE, AND CHOLESTEROL SCREENING

While you are in the "Men's Screening Clinic" you can have your blood pressure checked and receive testing for Cholesterol and Glucose (blood sugar).

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
